



TEACHER, STUDENT, & PARENT GUIDELINES

Helping kids learn and teach at the same time – K thru 12th grade

On the Current Program page of our website http://www.ditc-eef.org/current_program.html are 50 (Yes! Fifty) endangered or threatened species within a 150-mile radius of Shepherdstown, West Virginia, USA – the home of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department's National Conservation Training Center.

In order for students to benefit from, and participate in, this environmental education project, we have six easy steps to follow. If there are not computers in your classroom, no problem, there are printable versions.

1. Study as many of the 50 subjects of endangered or threatened species in the Current Program section as possible in order not only to learn about them, but to become familiar with the website format: **About - Did You Know? - Test Your Knowledge**.
2. Choose one of the 12 categories in **School Zone** (3rd category is a creative program).
3. Pick any subject that fits the category to research and write about (duplications do not matter).
4. Forms for written submissions may either be printed out for students to write on or, equally, typed in directly via the computer.
5. Completed subjects may either be mailed with submission form to:

6. The Art and Nature category - Any creative work done for this category will require the original or a photograph of the student's work (poetry, essay, picture, sculpture, photography, etc.) to be mailed or E-mailed to the Foundation as in Step 5 in order to be exhibited on the website.
